We use many with plural countable nouns (-/?).

There aren't many chairs in the classroom.

How many eggs are there is this cake

He doesn't have many friends.



We use **much** with **uncountable nouns (-/?).**

There isn't much cheese in the fridge.

How much water should I drink?



We use a lot of/ lots of with countable and uncountable nouns (+/?).

I need a lot of coffee a day.

Do you have a lot of pens?

She has a lot of pets.



Do you have a lot of money?



We use **a few** with **countable nouns (+).**

We use **a little** with uncountable nouns (+).

There are a few books on the shelf.

I have a little milk you can use.



We stayed a few days in Paris.

She has a little time to relax now.

UNCOUNTABLE

There's a lot of cheese. (+)

There's a little cheese. (+)

There isn't much cheese. (-)

How much cheese is there? (?)

COUNTABLE

There are a lot of eggs.

(+) There are a few eggs.

There aren't many eggs.

How many eggs are there?
